[Clearly contemporary with Epp. 461, 465, and 468. Dr. Reich and Mr. Nichols agree in placing this after Ep. 468; but as the tense used about the despatch of the bill, together with Ep. 465, is the same in both cases (*misi*; l. 6 and Ep. 468. 2), there is no reason for deciding that one of these two letters accompanied them rather than the other: for the addition of *nuper* here in l. 7 does not affect the position. It seems to me easier to suppose that More sent off Ep. 465 and the bill as soon as they arrived, c. 17 Sept., perhaps without any accompanying letter; and that both this letter and Ep. 468 were written shortly afterwards, this being the earlier and accompanying the letter mentioned in Ep. 468. 6, 7. Certainly it might be expected that a letter written from Calais c. 27 August (l. 1 n.) would reach London before rather than after 22 Sept.]
