"Leading Citizens"

From the time of Homer and Plato—emphasized by Thucydides, Aristotle, Cicero, Plutarch, Thomas More, and Shakespeare—through the American Founding, fostering "leading citizens" was a conscious element in educating the young. In the words of Cambridge scholar Quentin Skinner, "Fostering a virtuous and educated citizenry provides the key to upholding the liberty of states and individuals alike." These words summarize a tradition that goes back to the beginnings of our Western heritage, and the purpose of this weekend conference is to explore educational approaches towards recapturing this powerful tradition and especially its vision of "leading citizens."
